- Look through the newspaper with your child. What headlines interest him/her? Read it together and discuss it.
- Let your child quiz you about things he/ she is learning in school.
- Name different types of punctuation with your child. Identify them in a newspaper or magazine.

### EXPECT THE BEST FROM YOUR CHILD—AND GET IT!

Researchers say expectations play a key role in a student's success. When parents and teachers hold positive hiah expectations, children usually live up to them. Emphasize the THREE A's: Attendance, Attitude, Achievement. Add the THREE B's: Be positive, Be consistent, Be there for your child. Help your child develop positive habits too. Don't try everything at once. Tell your child that positive habits can make his/her life easier and more pleasant. Experts say that when an action is repeated every day for 21 days, it is likely to become automatic. Expect your child to act on her new habits for 21 days

## **DRUG ABUSE RESITANCE EDUCATION** 5th GRADE PROGRAM GRADUATES!

**D.A.R.E.** is an international education program that seeks to prevent use of controlled drugs, membership in gangs and violent behavior. DARE, has expanded globally since it's founding in 1983 and it is a control strategy of the American War on Drugs. Students who enter the program sign a pledge not to use drugs or join gangs and are taught by local police officers about the dangers of drug use in an interactive in-school curriculum which lasts ten weeks.
