Children Who Volunteer Learn More

Children learn important lessons when families volunteer together. They learn about kindness. They see citizenship in action. They learn people are more alike than different. Children who volunteer regularly are more likely to get better grades in school. They know more about future careers than those who don't volunteer.

To get your whole family volunteering:

- Decide on volunteer projects as a family.
- Start small. Try some one-time projects at first.
- Look for projects that let kids do something real.
- Talk about what you do and see. Be sure to praise your child for the things she did. "I was so proud of you when you carried the tray for that mother. She needed a hand!"
