## **Teach Your Child Math Facts**

These days, even the youngest children know how to use a calculator. But it's still important that they be able to do math problems without one.

If your child is just learning math facts, or if she needs to brush up on facts taught earlier, try using flash cards. Ask the teacher what math facts your child should master at her grade level.

You and your child can make your own flash cards with problems like "9 x 3" on one side and the answer ("27") on the other. Then vary the way you use the cards. Here are some ideas:

- Have your child write or say the answer as you show her the problem.
- Try showing her the answer and asking for the question that goes with it, like on the TV game show *Jeopardy.*
- **Sort out the problems** which are easy and then do extra work on the harder ones. Sometimes, mix them up and go through them all.
- **Use odd moments** to practice. Work on the number facts with your child while folding laundry, while you're cooking dinner together or before bedtime.
- **Keep the practice sessions short.** End them with words of praise for successes and good effort, and your child's math skills will be reinforced!

## **Let Children Make Gifts Themselves**

December is a busy month. Have a family meeting to plan how everyone can help share the workload. It is also a good time to reinforce the idea that effort and attention leads to success in school and in relationships with others. If your family will have a gift-giving occasion this month, teach your child that giving a thoughtful gift he made himself can mean more than one from a store. All you need are some simple supplies, like paper, crayons and paint, packaging from around the house and some imagination!

First, talk to your child about giving gifts. What does it mean to give something to someone?

Then, brainstorm what your child might give to a family member or friend. Does he have a special talent? Could he sing or write a song? Is there a chore he could do—like washing the dishes for a week? Perhaps he could lend a special toy to a sister or friend for a week.

If the gift is a chore or other activity, have your child make a card with a note on it describing the gift.

Help your child use imagination to come up with an interesting package. For example, he could make an envelope out of newspaper comics.

## Thankfulness Builds a Positive Attitude

When children have a positive outlook, they do better in school. Thinking about the good things in one's life builds that attitude.

Take time to sit down together. Make and share lists of what you're thankful for. Be sure to mention school and any progress your child is making. Has a teacher done something special to help your child? Does a teacher make school so interesting that your child is happy to start each day?

Don't stop with just a list. Tell your child to take a few minutes to say, "Thanks.

# Open a Savings Account For Your Child

Teaching your child money management can boost his responsibility, math and life skills. One way to do it is to open up a savings account in your child's name at a local bank or credit union.

Have your child help you keep track of deposits, withdrawals and interest. Over time a savings account will teach him that planning and saving toward a goal will get him something substantial he wants—whereas impulsiveness and "splurging" will not.
