## WHAT IS ADVANCED PLACEMENT?

- AP classes offer rigorous, college-level work to help students develop knowledge and skills to be successful in college and career.
- The courses align to national curriculum frameworks outlined by the College Board and curriculum committees composed of college and high school faculty.
- Through participating in the May testing for AP courses, students may earn college credit for courses taken for high school credit.



# BENEFITS OF AP COURSEWORK

- Exposure to rigorous, college-level curriculum
- Opportunity to earn college credit and/or advanced placement
- Good predictor of college success
- Enhanced college attractiveness
- College tuition savings
- Competitive edge for scholarship dollars



# AP VS. DUAL ENROLLMENT

- Advanced Placement
  - Ability to make up to 105 in the course
  - Additional quality point added to GPA
  - Easier accessibility to the instructor
  - Calendar follows school schedule
  - Nationally recognized curriculum

- Dual Enrollment
  - Uses letter grading (A=95 etc.)
  - No additional quality point added
  - Transportation is student's responsibility
  - Breaks are different from FCBOE
  - Increase in poor grades and scores



# AP GRADES & TRANSCRIPTS

- ❖ 5 points are added to semester grades in all AP classes, provided the student passed the class with a 70%
- Transcripts will include two grade point averages:
  - Unweighted GPA: Average of all grades accumulated in high school, with 5 points added to AP course grades
  - Weighted GPA: Average with one quality point added per AP course



### **AP EXPECTATIONS**

- Complete required summer reading and assignments
- Remain in the class for a full year
  - No schedule changes at semester break for any reason (including dual enrollment conflict)
  - Signed contract required
- Pay for and complete the AP Exam



## **AP EXAMS**

- Standardized exam written by College Board given at end of course in May
- Spring semester final exam is waived in an AP course
- Required EOC test may serve as final exam
- Students are <u>required</u> to take the exam and pay exam fee (currently \$93 per exam)
- ❖ AP Tests are graded on a scale of 1-5
- Score of 3, 4, or 5 signifies that the student is qualified to receive college credit
  - 3: Qualified to receive college credit
  - 4: Well-Qualified to receive college credit
  - 5: Extremely Well-Qualified to receive college credit

## QUALIFICATION GUIDELINES

- This is not a competitive process between students
- ❖ Teachers try to predict success by accepting students who show promise of success in the class. The goal is predict the potential to score 3, 4, or 5 on AP exam.
- Students will be deemed:
  - Qualified (met minimum qualification)
  - Pending (did not meet minimum—is reevaluated for potential success)
  - Not Qualified (did not meet minimum qualification)



### **HOW TO APPLY FOR AP:**

Two ways to qualify for an Advanced Placement class

Automatic Qualification

Standard Qualification



## AUTOMATIC QUALIFICATION

- Proven success in other content-area courses
- Qualification criteria appears on the application
  - Prerequisite course grades
  - PSAT scores
- Will not be denied if qualification guidelines are met
- Students do not have to go through total application process



## STANDARD QUALIFICATION

- Evaluated on a rubric against predetermined criteria:
  - AP Potential (based on your PSAT score)
  - Content area and overall GPA
  - Rigor of previous coursework
  - PSAT/SAT/ACT Scores (Writing, Verbal, and/or Math)
  - Work samples:
    - Diverse Visual Arts Comprehensive Portfolio
    - Time Writings

### **APPLICATION PROCESS**

- 1) Complete 1 application per AP class
  - AP Application link <a href="http://tinyurl.com/MHS-AP1718">http://tinyurl.com/MHS-AP1718</a>
  - Must be logged on to student fcboe account to complete the application
  - Print and sign completed application sent to your student email
- 2) Attach a copy of your transcript and PSAT scores
  - Transcripts will be distributed through 1<sup>st</sup> period on Friday, January 13
  - PSAT scores were passed out on January 6 and can be retrieved at www.collegeboard.org
- 3) Attend timed writing sessions (for Standard Qualification in select APs)
- 4) Turn in application documents to Registrar's Office course teacher by January 20 at 4:00 pm

- Maximum Course Exemption Request Form (in Registrar's Office)
  - Required if planning to take more than 3 AP classes; we recommend that a student take no more than 3 AP classes (3 is a full college load)
  - Attend AP Maximum Course Exemption Meeting on January 19 at 3:50 pm in Media Center or Friday, January 20 at 8:00 am in Auditorium
    - Required for students interested in taking more than 3 AP courses; must bring signed form with you
