Dear Parents,

We are pleased to share that our school system continues to implement measures to increase our school's security. Thanks to funds provided by the Education-SPLOST, Flat Rock now has access control for the front doors. It will be active on Tuesday, September 5, 2017.

The system includes an easy-to-use Intercom System with a bell and camera at the front door. Once morning student arrival concludes, the front doors will be locked at 8:15 and all entry will require access request.

When you visit after the school day begins, you will access the panel at the right of the front door and follow the posted directions. Upon entry, all visitors will continue to go immediately to the front office for assistance with the purpose of his/her visit.

Though we realize that changes in procedures may be inconvenient, our new controlled access will only enhance our mission of keeping our school a safer place for your children. Thank you so much for your assistance.

Burch Elementary, North Fayette Elementary Flat Rock Middle School & Sandy Creek High School Together – WE CARE!


Please join us in supporting our friends and neighbors in Houston, Texas, through the difficult aftermath of Hurricane Harvey.

job duties, they will not be successful in their fields if they are consistently late to work, lack the ability to work with others, cannot communicate, or do not dress appropriately.


That is why Flat Rock Middle has initiated Dress for Success every Wednesday for the school's business education and computer science students. The initiative is to help prepare students to be college and career ready by

teaching them the soft skills they will need to be successful in all facets of life.

"Just as they would if they had a job interview or wanted to be part of the work-based learning program, students come in their best attire to set the standard for professionalism," says Ashley Hare, business education and computer science teacher at Flat Rock.

Males are expected to wear dress shirts, which must be tucked in, along with dress pants, dress shoes, and a tie. Females must wear matching suits, knee length skirts or ankle length pants, a blouse, and dress shoes. Students can also opt to dress business casual for 90 percent of their grade. They cannot wear athletic shoes or denim; otherwise, they lose all points for the Dress for Success assignment


