Underline & Brackets: Within the text of the book, and as you read, underline or otherwise note anything that strikes you as important, significant, or memorable. Always write brief comments within the side margins that indicate your motivation in underlining. Focus on essential stylistic devices

Vocabulary/Allusions: Within the text of the book, <u>circle words or allusions to works of literature</u> that are unfamiliar to you or whose use strikes you as unusual or inventive

Questions: Actively engage the text and further/confirm your understanding of each chapter by writing questions that you have as you are reading
